

Birds in the **Red River Valley**

A partial list of birds in the gallery forest (the narrow band of forest along the river) of the Red River today.



Cooper's hawk (Accipiter cooperii)

Length: 10"-14"

Features: Small size; wings short, rounded: tail long, barred; breast finely striped with cinnamon. Fly by flapping wings several times & gliding with wings flat or slightly bowed, then flapping a few more times.

Habitat: Woodlands, brushy areas.



Red-tailed hawk (Buteo jamaicensis)

Length: 19"-26"; wing span 4 1/2"

Features: Bright tail, conspicous in flight; throat & underparts white with dark belly band. Holds its position in a stiff breeze; hunts from the air and from exposed perches.

Habitat: Open woodlands.



Black-billed cuckoo (Coccyzus

erythropthalmus) **Length:** 10 1/2"-12 1/2"

Features: Long slim bird; grey-brown above, white below; underside of tail black; 3 pr. of large white spots, reddish-brown wing patches visible in

flight. Call: cuk-cuk-cuk.

Habitat: Moist second-growth woodlands, brushy

areas near water.



Great horned owl (Bubo virginianus)

Length: 18"-24"

Features: Large size, widely spaced ear tufts; mottled brown above, lighter below with fine dark barring. Various calls include a series of muffled hoots: hoohoo-hoo, hoooo-hoo.

Habitat: Scrub areas, woodlands, bottomlands.



Downy woodpecker (Picoides pubescens)

Length: 5"-6 1/2"

Features: Small size, short bill; black & white pattern on head & wings; white back; red patch on head. Barbed tongues to extract wood-boring insects from

Habitat: Woodlands, orchards, suburbs, parks.



Hairy woodpecker (Picoides villosus) Length & Features: Similar to Downy Woodpecker. but larger. Forest dweller; probably named for the

short feathers around its nostrils.



Yellow-bellied sapsucker (Sphyrapicus

varius)

Length: 7"-8 1/2"

Features: Long white wing stripe; black, white, and red pattern on head & neck. Drills rows of holes in birches & orchard trees, removing the nutritious inner bark, & eating the sap that runs out, as well as the insects trapped in it.

Habitat: Forests, woodlands, orchards, parks.

Yellow shafted flicker (Colaptes auratus)

Length: 10"-13"

Features: White rump; black crescent at throat; yellow on underside of wings & tail; male with mustache of black. Often seen on the ground, searching for ants & licking them up with its long tongue. Call: wick-a, whik-a, wick-a. **Habitat:** Farmlands, suburbs, parks, open

Great crested flycatcher (myiarchus crinitus)

Length: 7"-9"

Features: Reddish-brown tail & wing patch; yellow belly; whitish wingbars; slight crest. Calls: loud, clear wheep or rolling crreep.

Least flycatcher (Empidonax minimus)

Length: 4 1/2"-5"

Features: Small size; belly white or pale yellow; head & back olive-gray; whitish eye ring & wingbars. Call: chebec—as often as 75 times a minute, Male sometimes adds a warble—chebec,tree-treo, chebec, tree-chou. Habitat: Open forests, orchards, rural towns,

Eastern wood pewee (Contopus virens) Length: 5"-6"

Features: brownish olive above, whitish below; conspicuous white wingbars; no eye ring. Call: Pee*a-wee*, up and down in pitch, repeated every 5-10



Blue jay (Cyanocitta cristata)

Length: 9 1/2"-12"

Features: Pointed crest: black "necklace": bright blue above with white on wings & tail. Noisy bird known for raucous voice & wide variety of calls, cries, & screams.

Habitat: Woodlands, farmlands, suburbs, city parks.



Common crow (Corvus brachyrhynchos)

Length: 16"-20"

Features: Glossy black, with black bill, legs, and feet; rounded wings and tail. Most intelligent of birds. Habitat: Forests; woods near water; open areas;

farmlands; suburbs.





Length: 4 1/2"-5 1/2"

Features: Mostly light gray; black cap and throat; white cheek patch. Call: chick-a-dee. Habitat: Mixed & deciduous forests,

suburbs, parks.

White-breasted nuthatch (Sitta carolinensis)



Length: 5"-6"

Features: Black crown and nape; blue-gray above, white below; bill long & straight: Habitually climb down tree trucks headfirst, gathering insects & insect eggs from crevices under the bark.

Habitat: Mixed & deciduous forests, groves,

suburbs.

American robin (Turdus migratorius)



Length: 9"-11"

Features: Bright reddish-orange below; dark gray above, broken eye ring & white-tipped tail. Habitat: Open forests, farmlands, suburbs, parks,

sheltered areas with fruit trees.

Yellow-throated vireo (Vireo flavifrons) **Red-eved vireo** (Vireo olivaceus)



Length: 5"-6 1/2"

Features: White eye stripe; gray cap greenish above, white below; no wingbars. Persistent singer with lengthy passages of

short, two-to six-note phrases.

Habitat: Deciduous woodlands, suburbs.



Warbling vireo (Vireo gilvus)

Length: 4 1/2"-5 1/2"

Features: No conspicuous markings; grayish green

above, white below.

Habitat: Open mixed & deciduous forests; groves; orchards; shade trees in towns & suburbs.



Yellow warbler (Dendroica petechia)

Length: 4"-5"

Features: Mostly yellow; male streaked with reddish on breast; female duller. Call: pip-pip-pipsissewa-is-sweet & wee-see-wee-see-wiss-wiss.

Habitat: Riverside woodlands, wet thickets, brushy marsh edges, orchards, suburbs, parks.



American redstart (Setophaga

ruticilla)

Length: 4"-5 1/2"

Features: Male black, with white belly & orangish patches on wings & tail; female grayish above, white blow with yellow patches. One of commonest warblers.

Call: set of single or double notes on one pitch, which may end with a higher or lower note—xee-xee-xee-xee-

xee-xeeo.

Habitat: Second-growth deciduous forests, thickets, suburbs, parks.

Baltimore oriole (Icterus galbula)

Length: 6"-7 1/2"

Features: Sharp-pointed bill; male bright orange, with black on head, throat, back, wings, & tail; female pale yellow or orange below, brownish above, with white wingbars. Habitat: Open deciduous woodlands; shade

trees in farmlands, towns, cities.



Scarlet Tanager (Piranga olivacea)

Length: 6"-7"

Features: Male scarlet, with black wings & tail; female yellowish green, with darker

wings & tail.

Habitat: Thick deciduous woodlands,

parks.



Rose-breasted grosbeak

(Pheucticus ludovicianus)

Length: 7"-8"

Features: Heavy bill; male with rose breast patch & black & white pattern; female streaked brown, with white eye

stripe & wingbars.

Habitat: Deciduous woodlands, groves.



Indigo bunting (Passerina cyanea)

Length: 4 1/2"-5 1/2"

Features: Male indigo-blue, with blackish wings & tail, no wingbars; female brown above, whitish below, with faint streaking on breast. One of few birds singing at midday: sir, chewe, chewe, cheer, cheer, swe, swe, chir, chir, chir, sir, sir, see, see, fish, fist, fish.

Habitat: Brushy areas, scrubby fields.
