

## A NOTE FROM THE PRESIDENT

It's been a good ride and I'm proud of River Keepers' accomplishments and the direction they are heading. The effectiveness of River Keepers is one of those things that is hard to measure but from my perspective it is evident they have played a role in again making the river a focus of the community. I first came to live in Fargo in 1979 as a college student and as usual, whenever I find myself in new surroundings, I find myself drawn to the waters edge. The Red River was no exception. What I found different than most places I have visited was the general lack of interest by the community in the Red. Oh sure, I found fisherman at the usually hot spots downstream of the dams and a few people using the bike paths along the river but little other activity. That wasn't all bad. A few of us had the whole river to ourselves. When I joined River Keepers, I found myself in a sort of a predicament. Should I promote or encourage use of my "secret spot"? Well for one, I enjoyed letting people know what a great place the river was and could be and it was in their own backyard. I found myself taking life-long residents down to the river for canoeing or catfishing and seeing what a good time they had. A second reason for getting more people involved is frankly, to raise money for improvements or proarams that benefit the river experience. This financial investment can either come from private sources, grants or the taxpayer. To get our civic leaders to invest taxpayer dollars means they must have public support and rightly so. I believe River Keepers along with others have fostered community buy-in and support that has led to many improvements. The improvements that immediately come to mind are: dam retrofits, S.S. Ruby pontoon tours, renovation of downtown Moorhead parks, Establishment of the first restaurant overlooking the Red, a Main Avenue Bridge that's "connected" to the river, downtown Moorhead redevelopment, and a Riverfront Development Plan by the City of Fargo.

Well that's enough reminiscing, and patting on the back. There is still much to be done by River Keepers and I'm confident those that remain on the board and the new members will continue to make significant progress. Lastly, I know River Keepers will continue to be a success because of two dedicated individuals, Executive Director Bob Backman and Project Coordinator, Christine Holland. They have put their heart and souls into the organization and continue to do so.

## Canoeing and Boating Map Now Available!!!

Initial efforts led by River Keepers, began in 1998, to increase canoeing and boating on the Red River. Since then there have been numerous meetings up and down the valley, discussions, presentations, grant proposals submitted, and special events conducted. Hundreds of individuals, agencies and organizations have contributed financial resources, time and enthusiastic support to make this happen.

Results have included designation of the Red River as an official canoe and boating route by the state of Minnesota, completion of a master plan, a designation by the White House as an official Millennium Trail, and infrastructure improvement.

Under contract to the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR), part of this year was spent on developing a map, directional signage, and informational kiosks.

**Beginning Fishing on the Red:** Coordinated program with Moorhead Community Education and taught by Dennis Flom. 50 participants.

**Cavity Replacement Program:** Received grant from FM Area Foundation and ND Game and Fish. Wood duck boxes maintained by NDSU Natural Resource Management Club and NDSU Wildlife Society.

**Dams:** Worked with Army Corps of Engineers and others on South Dam retrofit. Project completed. There will be a portage. Continue to work with Water Task Force and others on Christine and Hickson Dams.

Dam Safety: Continued working with Fargo Moorhead Metropolitan Council of Governments Water Task Force regarding long term maintenance issues of buoys and signs.

Lions Conservancy Park: River Keepers continues to work with the Fargo Park District, Fargo Lions, and other. Native grasses and wildflowers planted. Volunteers mulched trees. Kiosk was installed. Completed outdoor amphitheater.



**Canoe & Kayak Rental:** Added canoe and kayak rental services at the S.S. Ruby landing. Coordinated "Tour the Red by Selkirk Canoe" class in conjunction with Moorhead Community Education. Had two canoe trailers donated.

- \* Ms. Graning's and Mr. Moe's 5th grade class from Moorhead's George Washington school maintained the nature trail at Johnson Park, made a new trail guide, and identified buckthorn plants.

Water Quality Monitoring Volunteer Manual: A 144 page Red River Basin Water Quality Monitoring Volunteer Manual written and designed with financial support from the EPA.



Water Quality Monitoring: Samples taken semi-monthly during ice free conditions and monthly during ice conditions. Working on impaired waters for the Fargo-Moorhead reach of the Red River with Red River Basin Commission, Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, North Dakota Department of Health, City of Fargo, City of Moorhead and others. Staff helped identify sampling sites, deploy and retrieve equipment, and outreach.

**Riverfront Development:** A Dow ntow n Fargo Riverfront Development Plan for the area betw een Dike East and Oak Grove was completed and adopted. Ensuring that the Main Avenue Bridge connects to the River has been a focus. Initiated and coordinated bus tour to St. Paul for 40 community leaders. Worked with Downtown Community Partnership and the City of Fargo on new dow ntown kiosks.

Promotional items printed. Worked with various groups to organize "Moorhead River Arts", a Tuesdays out in Moorhead program.
