Officially known as County Ditch 41, this creek is commonly known in Moorhead as Snakey Creek. Snakey Creek has long been a natural learning environment for many adventuresome youth in Moorhead.

Wildlife typically found in this area includes ducks, bald eagles, great blue heron, beavers, raccoons, painted turtles, redwing blackbirds, meadow larks, red foxes, otters, Canada geese, deer, snow owls, weasels, muskrats, great horned owls, tadpoles, frogs, bull frogs and toads, along with monarch butterflies and caterpillars.

DID YOU KNOW?

On October 30, 1941, Northwest Airlines Flight 5 crashed near Snakey Creek, resulting in 14 lives lost. The pilot, Captain Clarence Bates, was the sole survivor.
