

Rivers



Flowing into the Black Sea, the **Dniester River** was used by many ancient civilizations. Eastern European nonprofits and governments are working to resolve issues related to flooding, dams, and pollution.



Flowing through two countries, the **Red River of the North is** the longest north flowing river in North America. It has wide swings in flow regimen. It is used for municipal water supply, fishing, and historically for transportation.

Sister Rivers

Monasteries cultivate grapes for wine production. The arbor provides a beautiful backdrop and welcome shade on a hot day for tour participants.




The Mall of America's Underwater World provides close up views of a wide variety of aquatic animals.

War




A memorial to those who died in the recent civil war provides a reminder of the difficulty in resolving differences. Numerous wars have been fought in the Dniester River Watershed.

Military Museums




Numerous wars are remembered at this recently restored museum and cemetery for several nationalities and military branches.

In Moldova, as in America, hollowed out logs were used for early transportation and exploration.




Early exploration of American rivers is studied by the Moldovan contingent.

Water Projects



A large dam project, built by the Russians, was doomed to failure because designers did not understand the science of irrigation and issues related to water quality.

Water Quality Monitoring



Water quality monitoring tools are provided and demonstrated as a part of the Sister Rivers project.



High School River Watch students play a major role in determining the health of the basin's water by monitoring streams near their school. They demonstrate their procedures to Moldovans.

Wine



In eastern Europe, grapes are often produced or purchased locally to make wine at home. Moldova is known worldwide for it's excellent wine.



The Maple River Winery and Distillery, located in the Red River Basin, provided a variety of wines and spirits for Sister River events. Their wines are made from a variety of plants, including dandelion.
